4.2 Planning & Development Services Department, dated March 12, 1999 re: <u>Rezoning Application No. Z98-1045 – Okanagan Sikh Temple & Cultural</u> <u>Society (R. Turik/Turik Neumann Architects) – 1125 & 1145 Rutland Road</u> North (3360-20)

The Current Planning Manager indicated the property on maps displayed on the overhead projector and outlined the report for Council. The rezoning would facilitate the construction of a new Sikh Temple. The existing temple would be retained and used as an educational building or a similar use related to the church, the class 'c' heritage building on the site would be demolished, and access issues are still being negotiated. The Society has requested that the Public Hearing not be held on this application before May 18, 1999.

A member of Council asked that staff work with the applicant to retain the heritage trees at the northwest corner of the property.

- 5. <u>REPORTS</u>
 - 5.1 Inspection Services Manager, dated March 12, 1999 re: <u>Hours of Sale –</u> <u>Black Mountain Pub</u> (0540-20)

The Inspection Services Manager briefly outlined the report noting the Liquor Licensing Advisory Committee recommends in support of the application.

A member of Council suggested that the Liquor Licensing Advisory Committee consider setting up a procedure for inviting comments from the neighbourhood on this type of application.

Mr. Sandy Baker, applicant, advised the Liquor Control Board (LCB) has the authority to change the hours without having to post the intended change on the site, he has never received any complaints from the neighbourhood regarding the hours of sale, and he would start operating under the new hours as soon as approval is received from the LCB.

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5.2 Inspection Services Manager, dated March 17, 1999 re: <u>Class "A" Liquor</u> Licence – Funtrain Canada Inc. (0540-20)

The Inspection Services Manager reviewed the report noting the Liquor Licensing Advisory Committee recommends support.

Mr. David Lynch, applicant, advised that the owners have been in the tour business for 22 years and know the type of tourists that come into Kelowna. The Funtrain will start with 11 cars but 22 cars will be available and the agreement with CN provides the option to run 7 days a week if they have the bookings. The locomotive would be run by CN employees and the engine will either push or pull the train, depending on the direction travelled. A parking lot, managed by Funtrain Canada, will be available in the area of departure for shuttling people back and forth.

5.6 Arts Development Officer, verbal report re: <u>Summary – Arts & Culture</u> (7800)

The Arts Development Officer said that when he assumed his position with the City in the summer of 1995 his challenge was to change how the community thinks about the arts so as to see the opportunity which the arts present to the community. Over the past years infrastructure has been created to allow the arts community to contribute and make a difference in the community. The Parks Alive Program animates the downtown with outdoor entertainment during the summer, a manager has been hired to manage the community theatre, a public art policy has been approved by Council to enrich and beautify our urban landscape, Council substantially increased the investment in the Arts Foundation and created a Festivals Fund and a Cultural Tourism Marketing Fund to assist non-profit groups put their products on the market. The Community Arts Centre Project will be key to developing our cultural district and will be the anchor.

The Arts Development Officer advised that arts and culture in Kelowna is now ready to advance beyond the beginning stages, and the community and the community's artists will now be able to build the future the City has invested in. He thanked Council for the opportunity to help put Kelowna on the map for the Pacific Northwest for arts and culture and added that he will look forward to participating as a cultural tourist in future.

Members of Council acknowledged that Mr. Thorne has made a difference in Kelowna, expressed appreciation for the contribution, and wished him well in his endeavours to do the same for Greater Victoria.

The Environment Manager and the Environmental Technician entered the Council Chamber at 3:01 p.m.

5.4 Director of Parks & Leisure Services, dated March 17, 1999 re: <u>Millennium Project</u> (0330-20)

The Director of Parks & Leisure Services presented the report noting Council's recognition of the Community Arts Centre as the Millennium Project for Kelowna will be of assistance in seeking corporate funding and in fundraising for the project at the political level. No commitment is implied by this resolution other than support at this time, and although it is in the best interests of the community to complete the project as soon as possible, the City is not taking on any obligation to begin or complete the project by year 2000.
