# March 6, 2000

A Regular Meeting of the Municipal Council of the City of Kelowna was held in the Council Chamber, 1435 Water Street, Kelowna, B.C., on Monday, March 6, 2000.

#### 1. <u>CALL TO ORDER</u>

Mayor Gray called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

- 2. Councillor Shepherd was requested to check the minutes of the meeting.
- 3. <u>PUBLIC IN ATTENDANCE</u>
  - 3.1 Citizens Against Sexual Exploitation of Youth re: <u>Awareness Week</u>

Jill Watson, Community Liaison Worker with CASEY:

- Gave a presentation advising what CASEY has done in the past year and what they propose to do in the coming year to increase awareness of violence and sexual exploitation of youth.

Council:

- Mayor Gray read a proclamation declaring March 6-12, 2000 as Stop the Sexual Exploitation of Children and Youth Week.
- 4. <u>UNFINISHED BUSINESS</u>
  - 4.1 Director of Planning & Development Services, verbal report re: <u>Splash's</u> <u>Nite Club – Sunday Extended Hours</u> (0540-20)

Staff:

- The Director of Planning & Development Services attended a meeting, organized by Splash's, with downtown nightclub representatives last Friday to discuss the concerns identified by Council when the request for Sunday extended hours was initially considered.
- The Club representatives were provided with a copy of New Westminster's Social Contract as a sample contract for their review, recognizing that the problems to be addressed in Kelowna are different and will require different solutions.
- The Planning Director will meet with the night club representatives again next week and report back to Council on the social contract issue and then will bring back the request for extended hours after that.

### 5. <u>PLANNING</u>

5.1 Planning & Development Services Department, dated February 29, 2000 re: <u>Agricultural Land Reserve Appeal No. A00-101 – Gabriel & Linda</u> <u>Coupal – 3683 Berard Road</u> (6635-20)

Staff:

- The applicant is proposing a 2-lot subdivision of the 2.5 ha parcel within the Agricultural Land Reserve.
- The applicants have owned the property since 1976 and over the years have leased additional land to augment their farm operation.
- In 1989 they applied for a similar subdivision request but were denied by the Agricultural Land Commission. At that time, the property was zoned A-2 under Zoning Bylaw 4500 and the City of Kelowna supported the application.
- When Zoning Bylaw 8000 was adopted, at the recommendation of the Agricultural Land Commission, the property was designated A1 with a smaller minimum parcel size.
- The subject application differs from the 1989 application because the subdivision boundary has been changed to include all of the arable land within one parcel.
- If the subdivision is approved by the Land Commission, then a Rezoning Application would be required and the servicing requirements of the Subdivision, Development and Servicing Bylaw would have to be met.
- The Agricultural Advisory Committee recommends non-support because of concern for the future agricultural viability of the property.
- Staff do not recommend support because of concern about the potential negative impact on agriculture as the proposed subdivision could be precedent setting for further subdivisions within the immediate area.

Gabe Coupal, applicant:

- Read a presentation advising he has farmed since 1976 and providing personal farming background.
- Efforts to market this property in an effort to buy a larger parcel have been unsuccessful.
- All of the arable portion of the land would remain with the bottom parcel and that would enhance the viability because the farm operation would not be saddled with the non-farm portion of the parcel and it would also cost less to buy the farm portion.
- It has become increasingly difficult to lease land and this sale would provide the necessary capital to invest in a larger farm unit.
- Each individual application needs to be considered on its own merits so support for an appeal would not be precedent-setting provided it benefits agriculture.
- Urban uses are not compatible with agricultural uses.
- The Agriculture Plan looks at ensuring that certain roads are retained at a rural standard for farm use and others at an urban standard for urban use.

Council:

- The potential costs of road improvements that would be a requirement of the subdivision may well defeat the applicant's purpose for subdividing.
- Asked that staff review the servicing costs of the Subdivision, Development and Servicing Bylaw for 2-lot subdivisions in rural areas.

#### Carried

5.2 Planning & Development Services Department, dated February 29, 2000 re: <u>Agricultural Land Reserve Appeal No. A00-102 – P & D Logging Ltd.</u> (Al Horning) – 1850 Brentwood Road (6635-20)

Staff:

- The applicant is seeking to legalize the existing non-farm use within the Agricultural Land Reserve on the northerly 1.2 ha portion of the 17 ha site for storage of logging equipment.
- The Agricultural Advisory Committee (AAC) supports continuation of the non-farm use but is concerned that if approved by the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC), the property would have to be rezoned to Industrial to meet City zoning regulations. The AAC recommends that the ALC decision take precedent over City zoning regulations to protect from further intrusion of industrial uses in the area.
- Staff do not support this appeal because it is highly unlikely that the ALC would override the zoning and Industrial zoning would be contrary to the City's development policies that are applicable to the subject property and to the ALR objective to protect agricultural land.

Ms. Phyllis Pilon, P & D Logging Ltd.

- The subject portion of the property would be used for seasonal storage only.
- The portion of the property under consideration was a former gravel pit.
- There would be no change in access to the site.
- Some landscaping would be provided to visually improve the aesthetics of the site.
- The areas they log are east of the subject property and they would have to bring their trucks and equipment further into the city to find Industrial zoned property on Highway 33.
- P & D Logging is also leasing the adjacent property to the west of the 1.2 ha northerly portion of this site.

 This is a minor boundary adjustment between Shaw Cable and Cambridge Western Leasehold Ltd. in order to permit a realignment of Enterprise Way. The sliver of land being added to the LUC covering the Shaw Cable site will be used by Shaw Cable for parking.

Staff:

- The Okanagan Mission Community Hall Association is requesting a grant of \$50,000 to assist with their Millennium Project which is to upgrade and refurbish both the Okanagan Mission Community Hall and the Scout Hall on their site.
- The total cost of the project is estimated at \$199,000.
- The request does not qualify for any of the City's existing grant programs and so staff recommend that any funds approved by Council should be through Council Contingency.
- There are a number of other non-profit societies that own halls so approval of this request could be precedent setting for similar requests for assistance.

- The main hall and the scout hall are both connected to sanitary sewer.
- This is a priority project with the Community Hall Board.
- Senator Fitzpatrick has agreed to be the honorary chairman of this initiative.
- The City's interest will start to trigger the federal grant.

Gordon Butler, President of the Hall Association:

- The grey barn (main hall) will be changed back to a red barn.
- The Association has applied for federal and provincial funding under their millennium grant programs. Both grant programs require the funding to be matched with donations from the community.
- Hopefully the work will be finished by the end of October.

Council:

- This project may qualify for a grant from the Kelowna Heritage Foundation, and Wood *WORKS*! is a community organization where there could also be opportunities for funding or there may be funds available as a result of the Arts & Development Officer position not being replaced.
- Asked that staff refrain from bringing forward recommendations for appropriating money from Council Contingency.

# 9. <u>COUNCILLOR ITEMS</u>

### (a) <u>Pedestrian Crossing at Mission Park Shopping Centre</u>

Councillor Shepherd expressed appreciation to staff for finding a solution to her concern about pedestrian safety crossing Lakeshore Road at the Mission Park Shopping Centre. She reported that a signalized pedestrian crossing could not be justified but the City will enter into a partnership trial program with ICBC for the installation of in-pavement flashers. Small amber lights, based on lights used on airport runways, are embedded slightly above the asphalt surface and are activated by a push button.

(b) <u>Kelowna Secondary School Site – Richter Street</u>

Councillor Cannan noted that the School District is being forced to sell the existing Kelowna Secondary School (KSS) properties to contribute to their share of the costs of developing the future KSS site. He suggested that Council send a letter to the Ministry of Education stating the City's position that the KSS site is to be retained for future school use.

THAT a letter be sent to the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Finance advising that the City believes that the existing Kelowna Secondary School site will be required for education purposes at a future date and asking that no school properties within the downtown area be sold so as to retain the option for future school uses;

AND THAT a copy of the letter be sent to the School Board.

Council discussed incorporating the City's ownership interest in the land into the letter.

Councillor Clark questioned whether sending letters is the best approach and suggested that more time is needed to consider whether it may be more appropriate for the City and the School Board to approach Victoria jointly and to involve the local MLAs in the issue as well.

Councillor Blanleil suggested that if a letter does get sent, the public's expectation that at least a portion of the existing KSS site would be retained as park should also be mentioned.
