### 1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Gray called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

2. Councillor Nelson was requested to check the minutes of the meeting.

# 3. PUBLIC IN ATTENDANCE

3.1 Presentation by Jay Logie, General Manager and Tom Danyk, Executive Director re: Request for Financial Assistance – 2002 ROAR HydroFest

#### Jay Logie and Tom Danyk:

- The 2002 ROAR HydroFest is being planned for the Labour Day weekend.
- Their goal is to establish and maintain one of the largest and most successful Aquatic Festivals in Canada, anchored by the Unlimited Classes of power boat racing but with other add-on events including a street painting festival (chalk art), a three-on-three basketball tournament, beach volleyball, and a farmer and craft market.
- Asking for \$30,000 to cover the City-related costs with the intent that the City would partner in the event and provide financial assistance each year.

#### Staff:

- The City's Parks & Leisure Services Committee has already approved a \$5,000 Sport Event Development Grant for the event.
- The City's Outdoor Events Committee handles the formal approval of the event and has been proceeding on the assumption that Council is supportive of the event realizing that there would be some loss of public access to portions of the park during the event.

### Council:

- Questioned the event organizers at length about the type of boats that could be expected, public access to the areas requested for venues, how environmental impacts would be mitigated, and how the event would be managed.

Jay Logie and Tom Danyk:

- The 2002 HydroFest would showcase the Unlimited light class of hydroplanes; the Unlimited class boats would be premiered in the 2003 event.

The public would be able to walk from the Rotary Marshes to the tunnel in City Park without obstructions, throughout the event. The Hot Sands swimming area would be

blocked from public access only during the 2 days the show is running.

Explained what would be changed from the Thunderfest hydroplane races held in previous years in order to mitigate the impact on the environment, including moving the boat pit and hospitality boats from the north end of Waterfront Park to the south end of City Park by the bridge in order to stay away from the Rotary Marsh wetland area, and requiring the boating public to tie up to the log boom and shut down their motors while watching the events from the water.

Net revenues would be returned back into the community, 50% to future events and into a hydro-tech facility on the waterfront and 50% to a local charity or non-profit

group.

## Council:

- Staff to confirm that HydroFest would not be a commercial event.

- Staff to confirm that The Grand Hotel, Queensway Marina, Yacht Club and Downtown Kelowna Association support the event.

- Staff to confirm the City-related costs that would actually have to be paid (versus park rental fees that could be waived).

# 7. COUNCILLOR ITEMS

### (a) Community Heritage Commission

Councillor Shepherd asked on behalf of the Community Heritage Commission that Council consider a moratorium on development activity in the Lawrence/Bernard Area (700-800 block of Bernard Avenue and the 700-1000 blocks of Lawrence Avenue) until Council can discuss designating the area as a heritage conservation area.

The Acting City Manager advised that the residents/property owners have been surveyed regarding the potential establishment of the area as a Heritage Conservation Area and Planning Department staff will be reporting on the outcome of the survey. Agreed to send Council a memo outlining the timelines and then Council can decide if they want to pursue a moratorium.

### (b) Clean-Up of Graffiti

Councillor Cannan commented that some residents are feeling like they are victims of graffiti because they have to clean up their sites within 10 days or be fined. He asked that City Bylaw Enforcement staff revisit the requirement for victims to pay for the clean-up and consider options that could be put forward (i.e. locking up spray cans in retail outlets) to help reduce graffiti.
