- 3. PUBLIC IN ATTENDANCE

 - 4.1 Planning & Corporate Services Department, dated March 5, 2004 re: <u>Rezoning Application No. Z03-0075 – Frost Park Holdings Ltd. (Grant</u> <u>Maddock/Protech Consultants Ltd.) – 5010 Frost Road</u>

4.3 Planning & Corporate Services Department, dated March 9, 2004 re: <u>Proposed Parking Credit Policy for Mixed Use Developments In</u> Downtown Kelowna (0530-01)

Staff:

- The proposed policy provides criteria that would allow Council to relax parking standards as an incentive for mixed use developments in the downtown, without impacting the long term parking strategy.
- A Development Variance Permit would be required to waive the parking requirement which could only apply to the commercial component of parking. The maximum available would be 25 stalls in a year.
- Asked that the policy be retroactive to January 1, 2004 to capture a waiver of parking requirements that was granted by Council earlier this year.

- The report responds to the concern that 'Institutional' sites are not always being developed in accordance with what Council was told to expect on the sites.
- The Local Government Act does not allow municipalities to require a Development Permit for 'Institutional' development. The Community Charter has not changed that.

Council:

- Staff to investigate whether Institutional uses could be subject to a Comprehensive Development zone in order to tie what is developed to a particular plan; whether Council can deny rezoning on the basis that they do not like the proposed Institutional use; and whether Council can force a proponent of an Institutional development to build what they say they will build, once approved by Council.

- The survey would be conducted in mid-April with a report back to Council in mid-May. Anticipate that with the results of this survey the design can be narrowed down to one option to allow the additional design detail to proceed in order to show the community exactly what would be built and at what cost.
- Borrowing for such a project would require public approval, either by referendum or alternate approval process; staff recommend at this tme that a referendum be considered, once the cost and details of the proposal have been determined.
