BACKGROUND:

The Mayor's Youth Forum on Parks and Open Space was held on November 23 2007. Council received a verbal presentation on December 10 2007, and notice that the full written report would be presented later.

The Youth Advisory Committee are recommending a wide distribution of this final report to appropriate agencies, committees and staff so that the input from youth concerning these issues can be considered in the development of policies, strategic plans and budget priorities.

The fourth City of Kelowna Mayor's Youth Forum was held on November 23rd, 2007 with a focus on civic park planning from a youths' perspective. The pre-forum research and the one day event gathered important insights about the likes and dislikes of high-school aged youth

regarding the parks that they frequent. It also got youth experiencing park planning and considering the challenges of park planning in a rapidly growing city.

Two separate research activities took place in advance of the one day forum;

- 1. A study was completed by 19 pairs of youth to monitor and report on park activities in their immediate neighborhood. This provided empirical data "close to home" by youth impacted by the quality of the parks they regularly frequent.
- 2. The on-line survey tool was designed to quickly capture current park usage trends as well as student feedback on park planning and facilities from a youth perspective. There were 527 responses to the survey (83% from Kelowna and 17% from the Westside) from a population of about 6,300 secondary school students.

A total of 76 students, from all seven secondary schools in the Kelowna area participated in the preparation of the forum. They also participated in the one day forum held at School District #23 Hollywood Education Center. The agenda for the forum included:

- presentations from City representatives on park planning issues,
- feedback on the student on-line survey and youth discussion of park planning issues and collection of their idea,
- a tour of the Mission Recreation Park, which included a brief explanation of park planning consideration and a tree planting exercise,
- a planning exercise with professional planners that used four real park-areas.

Outcomes;

The Youth Forum provided the Parks division with the opportunity to:

- 1. Receive direct input from youth via the on-line survey,
- 2. Educate youth on the importance of our urban forest, challenges facing our urban forest and input on how best to encourage private citizens to plant trees. In addition students planted 375 trees and shrubs helping to enhance Mission Recreation Park.
- 3. Engage youth in local government through a planning design charette which led to a greater understanding of how youth can get involved now and in the future.

<u>Beach Parks</u> - The survey reinforced the important role beach parks play for youth and the need to provide appropriate spaces for informal gatherings. The City will need to continue looking at ways to increase the amount of beach parks to ensure future needs are met. The data also speaks to the need to provide appropriate space for unstructured activities such as volleyball:

- The most popular recreation activity for this age group is beach activities (78%) followed closely by hanging out (73 %),
- The most popular park for this age group was Mission Creek Greenway (32%) followed by City Park (31%). Gyro Park (17%) was the third most popular park,
- The top three things youth enjoyed about their favourite parks was:
 - o Place to hang out (28%)
 - o Place to relax (22%)
 - o Place to exercise (22%)
- The top three things youth like about Kelowna parks include:
 - o Access to Okanagan Lake (68%)
 - o Green Space (60%)
 - o Recreational Opportunities (42%).

<u>Safety and Security -</u> The level of public confidence for safe usage of City parks needs to be increased for youth and other age groups. The Parks division is continuing to work closely with private security companies, Downtown Kelowna Association, Bylaw and the RCMP to try and address issues in parks and at beach accesses as they arise. The ability for the RCMP and Bylaw Enforcement to respond must be balanced with the needs of the rest of the community:

 The number one barrier cited for not using parks was concern for safety (42%) followed by lack of motivation (12 %).

<u>Marketing and Communication</u> - Parks division will continue to use a variety of mediums to reach youth; a main objective is to provide a relevant web based data base for the public to search where specific types of activities such as beach volleyball are offered and where parks are located. This will be brought forward as a budget item in the next fiscal budget:

• The number one way youth would like to find out about Parks is the newspaper (62%) followed by the city's website (48%). Information they would like to receive includes Parks special events (64%), where specific activities are available (62%), type and location of parks (49%) and information about future parks (44%).

<u>Planning</u> - The information below will be considered when planning for future park initiatives. The Youth Forum Survey information was forwarded to the consultant developing the Recreation, Parks and Cultural Services Master Plan:

The 51% of respondents felt the City was doing a good to excellent job of meeting the needs of youth; four ways to improve parks for youth include providing more sport structures (25%), have cleaner parks and facilities (18%), provide more activities for youth (16 %) and have better security (14%).

<u>Design Charette</u> - Students were asked to design their ideal park; however they were given a number of parameters including budget, community needs and environmental requirements. Students were divided into six teams; each team was assisted by a professional planner:

- The four sites were Central Green, Gyro Beach expansion, Mission Recreation Park and Rutland Town Centre. The parameters varied depending on the site however all teams were asked to consider water conservation, percentage of pervious to non-pervious surface, safety and parking.
- The exercise proved to be the most popular portion of the day for youth; it gave them in opportunity to take what they learned in the morning, including the feedback they had provided through the on-line survey, and develop a park for youth. They gained a good understanding and appreciation of the complexity in the park planning process. It is anticipated that this greater understanding will continue to provide a benefit as youth engage in the public process.



SUMMARY

The fourth City of Kelowna Mayor's Youth Forum was held on November 23rd, 2007 with a focus on civic park planning from a youths' perspective. The preforum research and the one day event gathered important insights about the likes and dislikes of high-school aged youth regarding the parks that they frequent. It also got youth experiencing park planning and considering the challenges of park planning on a rapidly growing city.

One of the consistent results from the study was that casual gatherings or individual activities are more popular uses of parks for youth than events or organized sports. The two most popular parks are: Mission Greenway and City Park, followed by: Gyro, Ben Lee and Okanagan Mountain Park.

Only one half of youth think that the City (and the Regional District) are doing a "good" to "excellent" job of meeting the needs of youth. The most popular areas of satisfaction include: "Opportunities for activities and the diversity of parks" (e.g. beach activities, biking, running, water park, playground, skateboard parks, basketball, soccer fields, tennis courts, swimming, volleyball, and ice rinks).

The most popular suggestions for improvements were "More structures to practice sports activities" (e.g. beaches, swimming, basketball courts, trails, volleyball nets, soccer fields, playgrounds, jumps/ramps for free boarding, skateboard, tennis courts, hockey boxes, basketball, baseball, badminton, jungle gyms, a snowboard park for the winter).

The most frequently mentioned detractor of the park experience now and greatest threat to future park visitation was safety and cleanliness. Safety issues were specifically focussed on exposure to drugs and alcohol, homeless populations and intimidation by police and other adults. A planning-related concern was the negative impact of the growing population and availability of land for green space.

Youth want parks and green spaces, however their needs are not being fully met. They want to know that parks are safe (this includes adding safety features, like more lighting) and that they will enjoy themselves there. They want to be able to enjoy individual sport activities (like swimming, skateboarding) and organized/team sports (like soccer, basketball and hockey).

The overwhelming response from the participating youth was that the forum was a valuable exercise and meaningful to their understanding of civic planning and urban growth challenges.

OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Mayor's Youth Forums is to solicit information and ideas from local youth (grades 10 through 12) on civic and social planning issues. In the past, the Mayor's Youth Forums have addressed: garbage collection and disposal, transportation and youth social issues (drug use, family issues, etc.). This fourth youth forum is specifically focused on public park planning from a youths' perspective.

The first challenge with this forum was how to collect useful, relevant planning ideas from a population that is likely to be mostly uninformed about the topic of park planning. The second challenge was how to design a process that quite quickly allows youth to participate and provide planning information that would have some value to professional planners who are working on these issues daily.

METHODOLOGY

Parks Log

A part of the pre-forum research was a small study completed by 19 pairs of youth to monitor and report on park activities in their immediate neighborhood (within a 2.5 kilometer radius of their home). This information was designed to provide empirical data "close to home" by youth impacted by the quality of the parks they regularly frequent. A complete summary of the Parks Logs is presented in the Appendices.

On line survey

The on-line survey tool was designed to quickly capture current park usage trends as well as student feedback on park planning and facilities from a youth perspective. There were 527 responses to the survey from a population of about 6,300 secondary school students. The main results from the survey are reported in this report, a complete summary of the survey results is contained in the Appendices.


One-day Forum

A total of 67 students, from all seven secondary schools in the Kelowna area participated in the preparation of the forum. And 54 students (representing all secondary schools) participated in the one day forum held at School District #23 Hollywood Education Center on November 23, 2007. The agenda for the forum included:

- 1. presentations from City representatives on park planning issues
- 2. feedback on the student on-line survey and youth discussion of park planning issues and collection of their idea (see "Findings" below
- 3. a tour of the Mission Recreation Park, which included a brief explanation of park planning consideration and a tree planting exercise
- a planning exercise with professional planners that used four real parkareas (including one area that is a potential park) in Kelowna as the examples

Presentation to Mayor and Council

On December the 10th a group of youth representatives and consultant Linda Abbott-Simons presented the preliminary results of the Forum exercise to Mayor and Council.

FINDINGS FROM ON LINE SURVEY

The on-line survey was completed in October, 2007 by 527 students with representation from all seven high schools in the Central Okanagan. High School participation ranged from 14 respondents at George Elliot High School to a high of 223 respondents from Kelowna Secondary School. Twenty-one questions were asked relating to current use of parks areas, satisfaction of park areas and suggestions for the future park designs.




Figure 1: School participation in on-line survey

1. What are your top 5 outdoor recreation activities?

The variety of park activities enjoyed by youth includes everything from swimming to slopitch baseball. Participation rates are high for a wide variety of sports (40-75% of respondents enjoyed a sport in local parks) with at least 10 major sport-type groupings getting the majority of responses.




Figure 2: Most popular recreation activities in parks

2. What City parks/trails do you visit most often?

The main parks and trails used (these results do not indicate park use for organized sport activities) are: Mission Creek Greenway, City Park, Gyro, Ben Lee and Okanagan Mountain Park (in order of popularity). There were 21 other parks or recreation areas mentioned - each of these was chosen by less that 2% of respondents (note that the majority of respondents were from Kelowna Senior Secondary).




Figure 3: City parks most often frequented

3. How often do you visit the park you go to most often?

About on half of youth frequent parks weekly or more often, while the remainder use the parks one to three times per month.




Figure 4: Frequency of visitation

4. What attracts you to the parks you frequent?

The most popular attraction for local parks was being able to be with friends (63.7%), and not necessarily involved in organized sports. Other popular reasons were: close proximity to home, green space, the venue is clean and it's safe.




Figure 5: Attraction of favourite parks

5. Other than organized sports, what are the main reasons you use city parks?

The vast majority of youth (50%) are using parks for social contact (with friends, relaxing, etc). The next groups in size are using parks for exercise.




Figure 6: Favourite uses of City Parks

6. What three things do you like about City parks?

The most attractive features for youth when thinking about City parks are the access to the lake and green space. The top seven choices, in order of preference, are:

- Access to Okanagan Lake
- Green space
- Provide recreational opportunities
- Cleanliness
- Provide opportunities to enjoy nature
- The are safe
- Diversity of park offerings




Figure 7: Top attractions of City Parks

7. How well do you think Kelowna is meeting the needs of youth in parks?

Only one half of youth (51.1%) think that the City (and the Regional District) are doing a "good" to "Excellent" job of meeting the needs of youth.




Figure 8: Rating of park services

8. If they are meeting the needs of youth: how are they doing this?

A total of 234 youth provided comments on how the City is meeting the needs of youth. The most popular acknowledgement (25%) pointed to "Opportunities for activities and the diversity of parks". These benefits included: beach, biking, running, water park, playground, skateboard parks, basketball, soccer fields, tennis courts, swimming, volleyball, and ice rinks.




Figure 9: How parks do meet needs of youth

9. What could the City do to better meet the needs of youth in parks?

A total of 252 responses offered suggestions as to how the City could better meet the needs and desires of the local youth population. The most popular suggestion (25%) was "More structures to practice sports activities", which included: beaches, swimming, basketball courts, trails, volleyball nets, soccer fields, playgrounds, jumps/ramps for free boarding, skateboard, tennis courts, hockey boxes, basketball, baseball, badminton, jungle gyms, a snowboard park for the winter.

It should be noted that security, safety, homeless people and drug use in parks were frequently mentioned as detractors to the enjoyment of parks.

A note on park cleanliness and safety: These results show that the youth surveyed consider the local parks they frequent to be both clean (22%) and safe (11%) and needing to be even cleaner (18%) and safer (14%). This is not unusual: our interpretation of these results is that youth appreciate the current effort to make parks clean and safe *and* they think more can be done.

10. In your opinion, what is the most important issue related to parks & recreation facing Kelowna over the next few years?

There were 467 responses suggesting a wide range of important issues related to parks and recreation facing Kelowna in the near future. The most popular entries represented a common theme in the survey: safety, cleanliness, and homeless people. The addition here is the concern about increased populations and the impact of building construction creating possible land constraints.

11. In your opinion what are the biggest barriers preventing youth from using parks and recreation facilities more often?

Of the five potential "Barriers preventing youth from using parks" provided the most important to youth is safety. Safety includes both tangible issues, like homeless people and drug use in parks, as well as parents' perceptions of safety. This was followed by motivation of youth to access the parks, parks not being welcoming (due to adult influences), a lack of activities and access/transportation issues.

12. What type of youth parks, recreation facilities or activities would you like to see in Kelowna?

The most popular request for youth-centric recreation facilities or activities (indicated by #1), at 21.2% of responses, was for venues that cater more to individual sports (Skateboard park, Bike park, trails for hiking, and dirt biking). This was followed (#2 at 20.5%) with requests for venues for organized sports (sports fields, Basketball. Volleyball, Tennis and hockey/skating). And the third most popular request (#3 = 13.2%) was for by indoor water-sports (water park, slides, pools). See below for other, less popular suggestions.






Figure 14: Preferred medium for advertising Parks

The Parks Log - Findings

The following is a summary of the records from the logs completed in October/November 2007 by 19 pairs of students (see the Appendices for complete details of the findings):

- About a third of youth do frequent the City's park information resources (web site, etc.)
- Favourite activities are unstructured games and social time with friends.

"My parents would like an improvement of the Greenway"

- Detractors from their experience include: homeless people/drug users, garbage, scat from geese, and a lack of physical play structures.
- ▶ Other than being close to the lake, favourite park features include: playground, open grass areas, concessions, swings, soccer field and keeping the park clean and safe.
- About one third of youth frequent parks outside the 2.5 kilometer radius of their home. Favourite destinations are City Park and Gyro Park. Other than the park not being appealing (e.g. it doesn't offer enough activities, or it too small), frequently mentioned barriers to accessing parks further from home are: transportation, opening hours, not knowing about other parks, and overcrowding in the summer.

Graffiti was the most commonly mentioned vandalism, followed by litter and damage to washrooms.

"We should put more money into parks"

- Suggested improvements to parks included: improved washroom facilities, better playground structures, longer opening hours, more garbage receptacles, better maintenance, more water fountains, and better security.
- Suggested strategies for marketing to youth included: advertising, organized events (e.g. BBQ's, concerts and sports tournaments), improved playground structures, improved maintenance and more police presence.

"...would do it (replant trees) anyways without an incentive.."

"We would not plant more trees in our backyard because of fire hazard"

Parent opinions: the majority of parents agree on the importance of parks and would financially support creating "ideal" parks.



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"What kind of incentive would encourage your family to replace the tree canopy? Answer: None we have too many trees already"

Parent opinions: one half of the parent's that were asked would support the replacement of trees lost to Pine Beetle on their property. Of those, the suggested incentives included: discounts on the trees and make it a community event.

"They believe the park idea (your ideal park) is superb. They would contribute tax payer dollars to it"

Dear Hugh and Linda:

Firstly, I would like to thank Mayor Shepherd for selecting Parks and Open Space for the topic of the Mayor's fourth Youth Forum. This was a unique opportunity and was much appreciated by the Parks Department.

The input from the youth has already been used by Parks; it supported items during budget deliberations (mountain bike skills park and washrooms) and during a recent meeting with RCMP and Bylaw regarding safety in City parks. It reinforced research the RCMP had completed earlier and justified the need to crack down on the minority who can make our parks feel unsafe for the majority, including youth. The youth has also recommended programming in parks; while this is already done to some extent the group will now look at bringing together a variety of stakeholders to see how we can maximize programming to discourage inappropriate use in our parks.

The timing of the forum also meant the input was forwarded to the consultant who is working on the Recreation, Parks and Cultural Services Master Plan. This is a document that will guide the direction our department takes over the next 10 years.

In addition to Parks receiving valuable information on what is important to youth when it comes to parks and open space the forum also provided participants with an opportunity to learn more about local government and how they can make a difference. I am hoping this will serve our community well in years to come regardless of the issue.

I feel the value parks received was directly proportional to the effort Marathon Communications, City staff and the youth put in to it. It was a coordinated effort by the entire team including the youth leaders and Jack and Felix from Canada World Youth. Thanks to this event Parks received more than 500 youth responses to an on-line survey that clearly indicated trends, 19 park audits indicating usage and barriers and an all day focus group where issues such as marketing, graffiti, vandalism and urban forestry were tackled by 60 youth.

In the afternoon students designed their ideal park with the help of professional planners using information from the on-line survey and budget constraints; the dialogue around individual tables balanced desires with public input and budget constraints.

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Once again on behalf of the Parks team I would like to thank Marathon Communications and in particular you two. The combination of your high energy and connections with the School District was a huge reason for the success of the Mayor's Youth Forum on Parks and Open Space.
