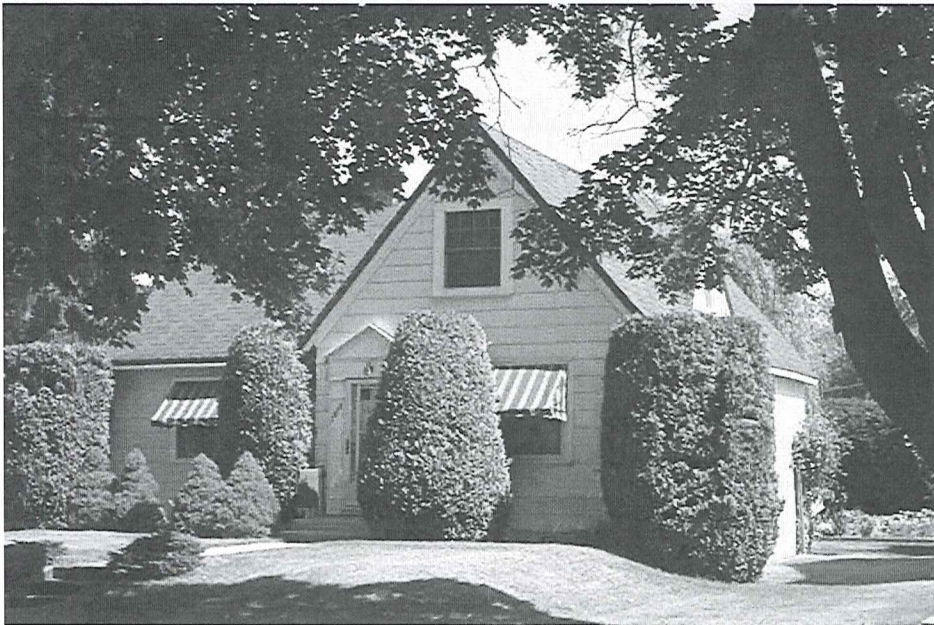

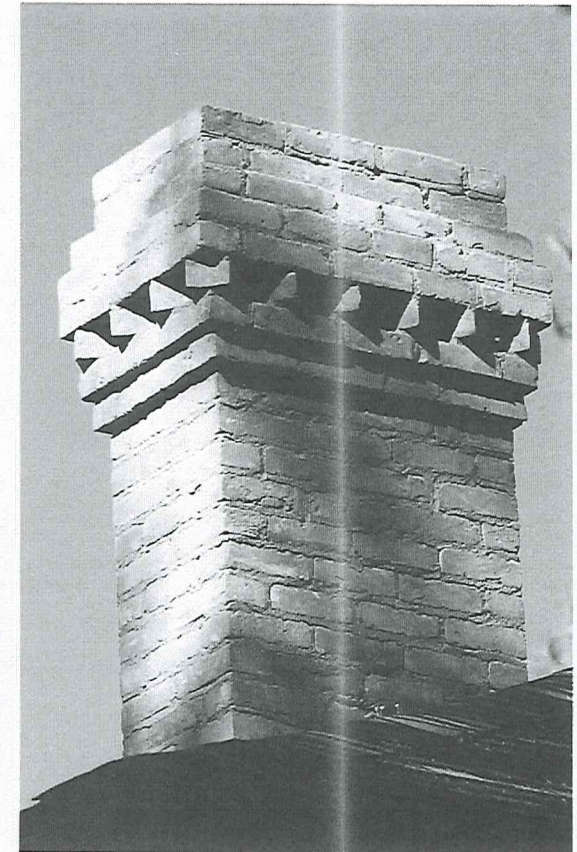

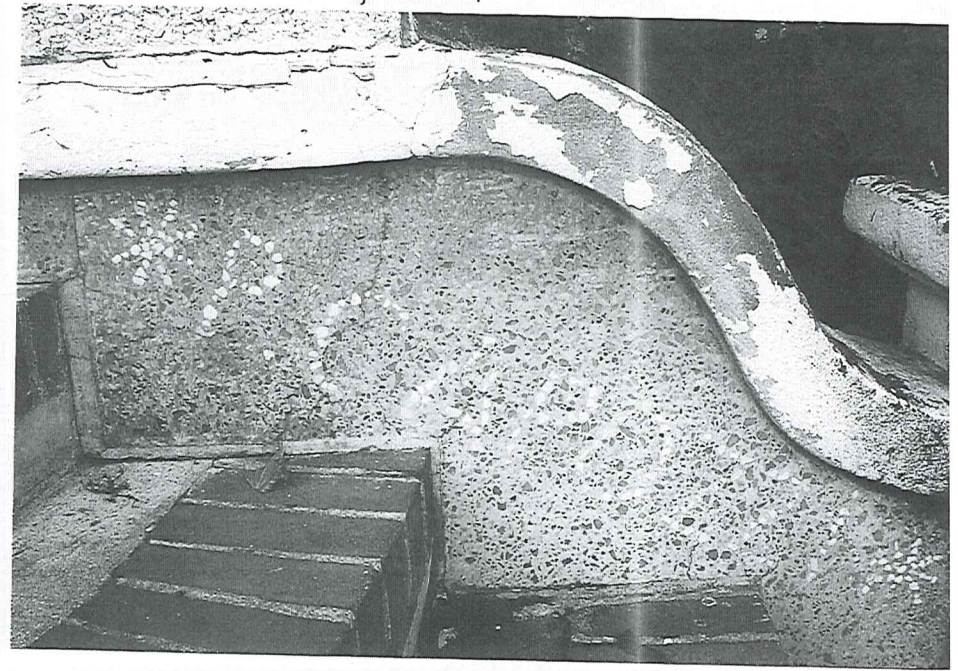

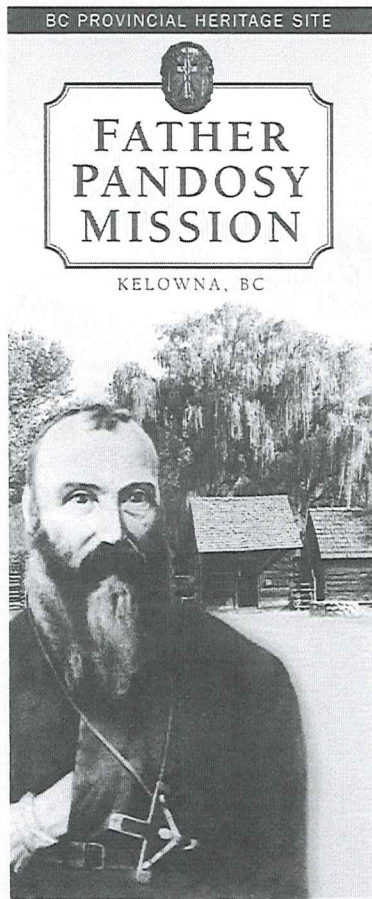

FATHER PANDOSY MISSION SITE

Wagon Shed: Features a collection of horse-drawn conveyances, including carriages, wagons and winter sleds.

Farm Machinery: A collection of early farm machinery—some still working—is maintained by the Okanagan Antique Power Club.

Wagon Shed

The Mission Barn: Built in 1886 of saddle-notched round logs, it was originally located further south on the property. The upper floor was used to store hay.

Blacksmith Shop: Built c. 1900 in the Joe Riche Valley, the building was taken down log by log and reconstructed on the Mission site in 1974.

Machinery Sheds

Brothers' House: One of the original Mission structures, the Brothers' House was probably used for a time as a school house.

Mission Chapel: The Oblates built the first chapel in the area. The lower floor was used as the Chapel, with the upstairs used as the first school house and living quarters for Father Pandosy and Father Richard.

Root House: Built to store fruit and vegetables grown on the farm, the root house is specially constructed with double log walls with a 4 inch space in between, packed with earth for insulation.

John McDougall House: A pioneer home built in the 1860's at Gusaachan Ranch by John McDougall, a fur trader. Moved in 1968 to the Mission site.

Picnic Area

Joseph Christien House: Built in Ellison in 1890 by David McDougall for fruit and cattle farmer Joseph Christien (1830-1916). One of the upstairs rooms served as a classroom for a time. The house was moved to its present site in 1970.

Entrance Gate

Cartaker's House (Private)
Built c. 1900 in East Kelowna, later moved to Gusaachan Ranch, then moved to the Mission site in 1947.
