#### Recommendation:

THAT Council receive for information this report dated May 6, 2010 from the Manager of Parks & Public Places.

## Purpose:

On December 17, 2009 at the Special Meeting of Council (Budget Deliberations) staff were directed to report back to Council with the new plans for the float.

## Background:

A budget of \$50,000 was approved in the 2010 Capital budget for the design and construction of a new parade float. The parade float travels throughout the region promoting Kelowna to communities in British Columbia, Alberta and the northern United States. It typically participates in over 20 parades annually and has been consistently successful in winning awards in many of its appearances.

The current parade float was constructed in 2000 and is in need of major repairs to the chassis. The float itself has broken down during a number of major events and during one occasion had to be towed through a parade due to failure of the drive mechanism. The float is long due for a complete redesign as the overall structure (ogopogo character, waves and animations) are worn and deteriorating.

<u>Process:</u> Staff have been working with the Ladies of the Lake Society and Float Ambassador, Clarence Johnson in the design of the new parade float.

Ogopogo was identified as the theme for the following reasons;

- The City has a long and positive history of using the ogopogo on the parade float (Attachment 1)
- Ogopogo is a popular and iconic image for the City, and
- Ogopogo appeals to all ages, and in particular evokes interest from children

<u>Design:</u> Jeff Chiba Stearns, a professional animator originally from Kelowna was engaged to develop the ogopogo character, based on the original story and to capture the legend of the sea creature as the Spirit of the Lake. The brief for the design was to develop a fresh new approach for ogopogo (Attachment 2).

The new image of ogopogo has been incorporated into a float design that includes the natural scenic beauty of Kelowna, including the mountains, beaches and orchards that surround our community.

The float will include 4 signs, one on each side. The front sign will read "Kelowna, British Columbia, Canada", the side signs will read "Spirit of the Lake, Kelowna, BC" and the sign in the back will read "Canada's Year Round Playground".

Construction: Staff received proposals and cost estimates from 3 parade float companies. Gary Turner Display Ltd was successful in their ability to deliver the float specifications on budget and to meet the sustainability objectives identified in the brief. The proposal included a more sustainable approach through the use of an electric chassis to replace the older drive mechanism and to reuse portions of the existing float including the base structures, sound systems, lighting and animation mechanisms.

The float will be complete by the last half of July 2010.






