### Goals and Objectives



This includes fire suppression and rescue, fire prevention, fire safety inspections, fire training, first medical responses, hazardous material response, specialty rescue and emergency management.
- > To promote a diverse and talented team of dedicated people that continue to provide realistic and effective fire protection, public safety and initiatives that deliver the highest possible standard of service to the citizens of Kelowna
- > To continue to develop, modify and implement the 10 year strategic plan to keep pace with population growth/development and evolving opportunities as it relates to staffing and future fire hall locations and service delivery.
- > The Fire Prevention Branch and Suppression Branch staff continues to educate residents and monitor open burning habits and promote the enhancement of air quality to ensure a natural, protected environment.
- ➤ Commitment to the Regional District of Central Okanagan through the management of the Regional Emergency Program, the Regional Dispatch Center and the Regional Rescue Program preserving a safe and natural protected environment and demonstrating strong innovative leadership.
- > To continue to partner with the public on community service projects where feasible.
- > To maintain Fire Department facilities, apparatus, equipment and resources in a high state of readiness and cleanliness at all times
- > To promote interagency cooperation and mutual respect among all other interacting organizations and their members
- > Continue to enhance awareness of staff responsibility, expectations and accountability, while managing people and incidents to develop strong innovative leadership and sound fiscal management.

### **Organization Profile**

The Fire Department operates under the direction of the Fire Chief who is responsible to the Mayor and Council through the Corporate Sustainability Division.

In order to deliver the services needed to accomplish our mission, the Department is organized into three major sections: Administration, Operations, Emergency Management/Communications.

**Operations** - The operations section is responsible for the delivery of emergency services for fire and rescue, first medical response, hazardous materials and the day to day operations of the fire department. In 2010 the Kelowna Fire Department had 9,403 emergency responses, ranging from structure fires to grass fires, from rescues and auto extrication to first medical responses.



### **Career Firefighters**

Kelowna Fire Department has one hundred and seventeen (117) Career staff working out of Stations 1, 2, 3 and 4. These individuals not only respond while on duty, but are called back to work on numerous occasions over the year when additional resources are needed by the on duty career staff.



### Paid on Call Firefighters

Kelowna Fire Department has seventy (70) Paid on Call members based out of Station 1, 7, 8, and 9 who respond from home or work 24 hours a day/seven days a week to fire and emergency calls. Service as a paid-call member in our community requires a serious commitment as members attend weekly drills/practices, optional training, as well as being called out to emergencies throughout the year.






### 2010 EMERGENCY RESPONSE, BY INCIDENT, ALL STATIONS

August was the busiest month in 2010 responding to 894 Incidents.





### RESPONSE COMPARATIVE BY YEAR

In 2010 the total number of emergency responses decreased by 3.23% from 2009. However emergency responses have increased 18% from 2007 overall. This is an average of 7.02% increase in emergency responses over a 4yr period.




### COMMUNICATIONS CENTRE

The Fire Dispatch Centre provides dispatch service for 8 Fire Departments consisting of 21 fire stations within the City of Kelowna and Regional District of Central Okanagan boundaries. The dispatch center handled 20,290 Incident reports during 2010.

The Fire Dispatch Centre is staffed by 8 Fire Dispatchers 4 of which are fulltime assigned to shifts and 4 that are fulltime relief dispatchers that move shift to shift for relief purposes. The Fire Dispatch Centre monitors various fire alarms throughout the City and the Regional District of Central Okanagan. The dispatch centre also handles the City's after hour's telephone service and City call out when city facilities are closed.

### Additional highlights include:

- > 9-1-1 system upgrades were completed in partnership with Telus.
- > Implemented Message One Call Back System with District of West Kelowna Fire Rescue.
- ➤ 9-1-1 call answering times remain above the industry average and NFPA Standards. A 2% improvement over 2009.
- > Call process times improved 19% over 2009. Now meeting NFPA Standards.
- Call dispatch times improved 29% over 2009.
- > 162,000 radio transmissions occurred in 2010.
- > 92,243 phone transactions took place.



We will continue to work towards modernizing the Fire Dispatch Centre to enhance service to our customers in a cost efficient and effective manner.



### **Apparatus Maintenance Support**

Kelowna Fire Department has two mechanics working out of Station 1 who maintain our emergency vehicle apparatus and equipment. Internally they report to the Assistant Chief Operations, and are directly under the Equipment Civic Operations at City Yards.



### **Building Maintenance**

The day to day maintenance of the fire stations is looked after by Fire Department staff. Upgrades and additions are completed by the Real Estate and Building Services department. The department is working on a phased in approach for facility upgrades and renovations over a long term basis.

### **Operational Highlights**

Kelowna Fire Department had many significant achievements and the highlights are as follows;





> In 2010 we completed the final inspection process on the new Telesquirt fire apparatus with a delivery date of January 2011.

- A second mechanic was posted to the main fire hall to assist in fleet maintenance.
- > We acquired the CPPI (Canadian Petroleum Products Institute) Trailer as City property for the Hazmat Response Teams.
- > Implemented new high rise equipment.
- > Request For Proposal and comprehensive Wear Trial Testing completed for fire fighter bunker gear.
- > Implemented 4 Lieutenants at Station 1 at the beginning of 2010.
- > Hired two (2) new fire fighters to replace retired members.
- Assisted and supported the wildland fires and evacuations of Seclusion Bay and Sailview Bay.



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In the summer of 2010 the department faced a number of large scale emergencies including the Stewart Centre fire, Barber Road apartment fire, Lakeshore Rd wildland fire and Knox Mountain wildland fire.



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- KFD operational guidelines continued to be reviewed and updated in 2010.
- > Paging system had some upgrades to enable separate page system for Squad 1 at the main fire hall.
- > Continue to liaise with regional emergency service personnel.
- > Continue to work/liaise with regional partners on service agreements, 911 dispatch, mutual aid, emergency program and regional rescue program.


Fire Prevention, Public Education and Training initiatives have been ongoing throughout 2010 with the following highlights:

- One Fire Inspector certified to NFPA Fire Inspector 1
- > Three (3) Fire Inspectors certified to Fire Investigator Cause and Origin Level I & II
- New Fire Prevention Trailer acquired for Investigations and Public Education
- > Training partnership established with the Justice Institute of BC
- > New Fire Officer Training Program established
- > Review of the Community Wildfire Protection Plan began
- > Guidelines for Development Permits in Wildfire Interface areas were drafted in coordination with other City Departments.
- > 714 Burn Permits were issued

### Inspections

We continue to strive to meet Fire Inspections frequencies in the City of Kelowna with 4,033 inspections completed in 2010 on a reportable 6,083 inspectable properties. The fire inspections are completed by the Fire Inspectors, Fire Officers and crews. Fire Officers and crews completed 1,040 of the 4,033 completed inspections.

Fire Inspections have increased over 83% from 2008 as a result of one additional fire inspector being hired in the branch in late 2008, the implementation of the additional Squad at Station 1, and the implementation of inspection benchmarks per Fire Inspector.



### Fire Investigations

In 2010 Kelowna Fire Department performed 21 structure, 5 vehicle and 7 outdoor fire investigations in the City of Kelowna. The ability for staff to perform these investigations was further increased by staff completing the Fire Investigator Cause and Origin Level I and II training hosted by Kelowna in the fall of 2010.



### **Public Education**

Public Education opportunities continue on a request basis. Visiting the fire station for fire and life safety education continues to be popular amongst day cares, pre-school and regular school classes.

Fire Prevention week saw crews doing presentations in the elementary schools, and hosting the Fire Chief for a Day Program in partnership with other Regional Fire Departments. The Kelowna Fire Department also continues to deliver the popular Child Passenger Seat Inspection Program at the main fire hall on Enterprise Way on Saturday afternoons.

### **Training**

The Fire Department Training Branch facilitated over 32,750 person hours of training in 2010. The department has enhanced the Fire Officer Training Program and is striving to meet accreditation levels in all disciplines of training. New in 2010 was the establishment of a training partnership with the Justice Institute of BC, and a commitment to continue to build relationships and partnerships with other agencies in the Region and Province to provide cost effective training opportunities in the Central Okanagan.
