Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund (CIIF) - Apex Trail Restoration

Recommendation:

THAT Council receives for information, the report from the Parks Planner, dated October 24, 2012, with respect to the Community Infrastructure Improvement Fund (CIIF) - Apex Trail Restoration.

AND THAT Council supports the application to Western Economic Diversification for a \$100,000 CIIF grant to fund the restoration of the Apex Trail at Knox Mountain Park.

Purpose:

To secure Council endorsement to support an application for grant funding.

Background:

On July 5, 2012, the Minister of State for Western Economic Diversification (WED) announced a new two-year investment program to support the capital renewal and enhancement of community facilities. These would include local arenas, community centres, sports fields, parks, fitness trails and bike paths. Program funding is based on matching contributions from the municipality. The maximum amount of grant funding is \$250,000 and priority will be given to smaller projects. Projects must be "shovel ready" to qualify for submission and completed by March 31, 2014. \$46,200,000 has been allocated to BC, AB, SK and MB over two years.

On August 7, 2012 Council endorsed an application for funding from this program for the first intake of submissions to be put towards structural repairs at the Rutland Family "Y". Staff has completed a submission for restoration of the Apex Trail at Knox Mountain Park to meet the November 19, 2012 deadline for the second intake of applications. Successful funding notification is expected within 90 days of the deadline or approximately February 18, 2013.

In November 2011, Kelowna City Council endorsed the Knox Mountain Park Management Plan 2011, (http://www.kelowna.ca/CM/Page2063.aspx) and directed staff to use this plan as a guide to follow in future planning of the park. With stakeholder assistance, 22 capital projects within the park were identified and prioritized. Implementation of these projects was broken down into four phases extending to the year 2026. Of the capital projects identified, restoration of the Apex Trail was the highest priority as it is one of the most heavily used trails in the park and is consequently experiencing degradation and conflicts between trail user groups.

In 2011 and 2012 budgets were approved to proceed with the restoration of the first phase of the Apex Trail. With assistance from CIIF, it is anticipated that completion of the final phase of the Apex Trail restoration will be achieved in 2013.

This project fits well within the objectives of the WED grant program, and staff are recommending moving forward with this CIIF grant application for the Apex Trail restoration.

The CIIF grant funding is contingent on matching municipal funding, therefore if the grant is successful, the City would need to contribute \$100,000. A budget submission will be requested in the 2013 Capital Budget for Council approval in December of this year for Apex Trail Restoration as a Priority 1.
