Re: District of West Kelowna Participation in Regional District Services

As you are aware, following the District of West Kelowna's request in 2012 for a review of services regarding the above, the Regional Board formed a Service Review Steering Committee to undertake an informal review and examination of the services identified in West Kelowna's letter. The Regional Board at its February 25, 2013 meeting approved the process framework for the review of the following services identified by the District of West Kelowna: Noxious Insect Control: Noxious Weed Control: Transportation Demand Management; Air Quality; Regional Planning and Economic Development Commission. The Regional District is required to amend bylaws in which Kelowna is a partner for the following services:

Transportation Demand Management

In regards to Transportation Demand Management, the City has confirmed in their letter of March 28th their request to withdraw from the Regional Transportation Demand program. RDCO staff will be preparing an amendment bylaw for Regional Board approval in the near future.

Noxious Weed Control

As Kelowna is a partner in the service of Noxious Weed Control, I wish to confirm that the following recommendations were approved at the Board's May 9th regular meeting:

#93/13 THAT the Regional Board endorses the District of West Kelowna's withdrawal from the Noxious Weed Service effective December 31, 2013;

AND FURTHER THAT the District of West Kelowna share in the reserve balance at the end of 2013 projected at \$14,107 (15.7% or \$2,210).

#94/13 THAT staff be directed to seek a letter of consent from the participating partners (City of Kelowna, District of Peachland, District of Lake Country, Central Okanagan East and Central Okanagan West Electoral Areas) that they are in agreement with the District of West Kelowna's withdrawal from the Noxious Weed Service Establishment Bylaw No. 671, and draft an amendment bylaw for Board approval.

The District of West Kelowna has provided formal confirmation that it will withdraw from the Noxious Weed Control and Transportation Demand Management service effective December 31, 2013.

At this time, in order to move forward with an amendment bylaw removing the District of West Kelowna from the service of Noxious Weed Control, I require a letter of consent from the City of Kelowna Council agreeing to the withdrawal of the District of West Kelowna from the Noxious Weed Service Establishment Bylaw No. 671.

Once this letter of consent has been received from the participating municipalities, RDCO staff will bring forward amendment bylaws for Regional Board approval.

As you are aware, the Regional District in 2010 adopted a Starling Control Program Service Area Establishment Bylaw (bylaw attached). The bylaw was put in place for a period of three years, ending in 2012. As staff were unable in early 2013 to confirm with the Okanagan Similkameen and North Okanagan Regional Districts whether they planned to continue funding the program for the next three years funding was provided through Regional Grant In Aid funding for this year. We have now confirmed with RDOS and RDNO they will continue funding \$25,000 annually.

As in 2010, we require a letter of consent to the adoption of a RDCO Starling Control Program Service Area Establishment Bylaw. Once we receive your letter a bylaw will be brought forward for Regional Board approval.

Bylaw No. 1262

A bylaw to establish a local service area for the purposes of providing funding for a Starling Control Program in the Regional District of Central Okanagan

WHEREAS a Regional District may by bylaw establish a service under the provisions of the Local Government Act – Section 796 (1).

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Regional District of Central Okanagan wishes to establish a local area grant service for the purpose of providing funding to the Starling Control Program, as has been established in the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen and the Regional District of North Okanagan;

AND WHEREAS the City of Kelowna, the Corporation of the District of Peachland, and District of Lake Country have consented to the establishment of the service of 'Starling Control Program' in the whole of their areas;

AND WHEREAS the District of West Kelowna does not consent to the establishment of the service but has committed to provide grant funds to a maximum of \$4,264 directly to the program;

AND WHEREAS the Central Okanagan Electoral Area East (\$300) and Central Okanagan Electoral Area West (\$664) directors have agreed to provide funds as indicated through their electoral area grant-in-aid program;

NOW THEREFORE THE REGIONAL BOARD OF THE REGIONAL DISTRICT OF CENTRAL OKANAGAN IN OPEN MEETING ASSEMBLED ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. The Regional District of Central Okanagan hereby establishes within the City of Kelowna and the Corporation of the District of Peachland, and the District of Lake Country a service for the purpose of providing funding to the "Starling Control Service".

Requisition Limit

2. The maximum amount that may be requisitioned annually for the service is \$25,000 for a maximum period of three years (2010-2012) and will expire on December 31, 2012.

Cost Recovery

- 3. The annual cost of providing the local area service outlined in this Bylaw shall be recovered by the following:
 - a) requisition of money under Sections 805 [Requisition of funds from municipalities] and Section 806 [Requisition of funds for electoral areas] of the Local Government Act to be collected by a property value tax to be levied and collected under Section 805.1 and Section 806.1 of the said Act.

4. This bylaw may be cited as the "Regional District of Central Okanagan Starling Control Program Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 1262, 2009".

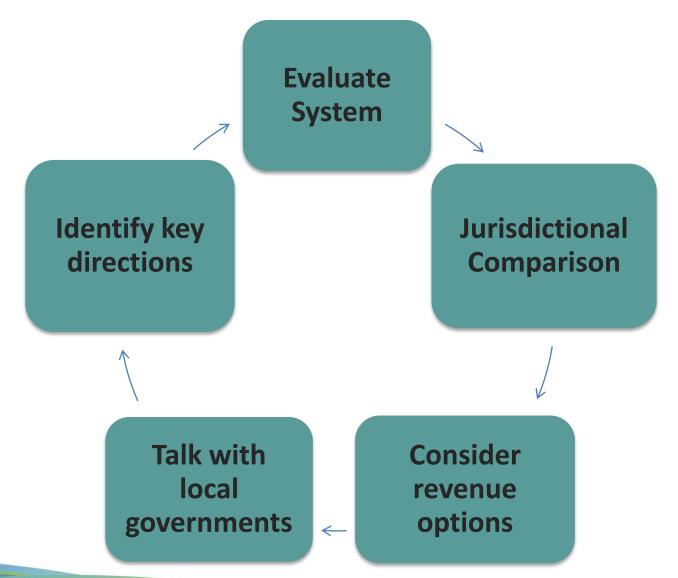

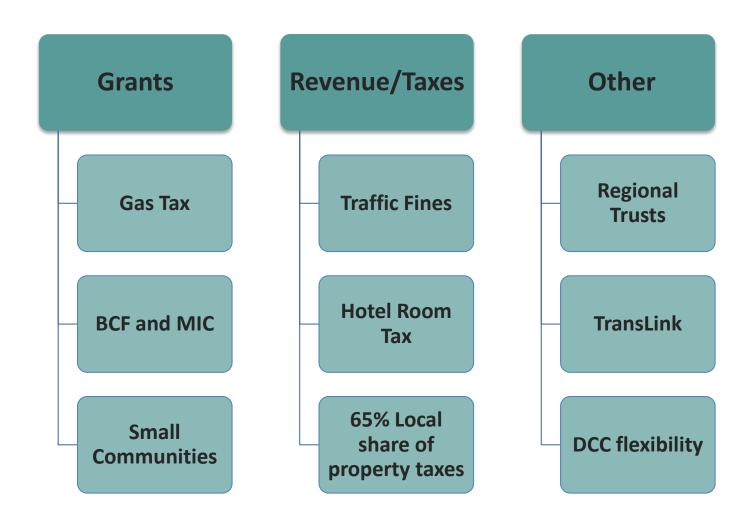
