THAT Council receives for information the report dated April 13, 2015 from the Cultural Services Manager regarding the presentation of a formal gift from the City of Kelowna to the City of Veendam;

AND THAT Council approves the purchase and presentation of the limited edition sculpture 'Freedom' by Kelowna artist Geert Maas as an official gift from the City of Kelowna to the City of Veendam in recognition of the 70th Anniversary of the liberation of The Netherlands from World War II occupation and 35 years of friendship between the cities of Kelowna and Veendam;

AND FURTHER THAT the purchase price of \$1,050 and any necessary expenses associated with preparing the sculpture for shipment and customs clearance be paid from the 2015 Sister Cities budget pursuant to Policy 355.

Purpose:

To authorize the purchase of a special gift from the City of Kelowna to the City of Veendam to mark the 70th anniversary of the liberation of The Netherlands from World War II occupation and 35 years of friendship between the cities of Kelowna and Veendam.

Background:

A delegation of 43 people is travelling from Kelowna to The Netherlands for a 12 day visit which will include official ceremonies to mark the 70th Anniversary of the liberation of the Netherlands from World War II occupation, and 35 years of friendship between the cities of Kelowna and Veendam.

The delegation includes His Worship Mayor Colin Basran, Councillor Maxine Dehart, representatives of the Kelowna Veendam Sister City Association and School District 23, World War II veterans, and 20 students from KLO Middle School.

To mark this special occasion, a gift will be presented by the City of Kelowna to the City of Veendam. Staff's recommendation for the gift is as follows:

'Freedom' - a limited edition sculpture by Kelowna artist Geert Maas

Price: \$1,050

Material: Cast bronze on a wooden base

Dimensions: $10.5 \times 11.5 \times 21.5 \text{ cm}$ (4.25 x 4.50 x 8.5 inches). Including base: 25.5 cm

FRONT BACK

Notes from Geert Maas about the work: 'The sculpture 'Freedom' was designed to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the liberation of The Netherlands from World War II. A full-scale monument of 'Freedom' is located at Robson Square in downtown Vancouver. Two clenched fists represent the war. Despite the war the human spirit has survived, which is depicted by the human figure escaping the war. The 'V' for *Vrede* (peace in Dutch) is also the international peace symbol that can be observed throughout the sculpture. The Dutch people have never forgotten the Canadian forces that liberated the Netherlands from German occupation.'

The sculpture is small enough to travel with the delegation. Upon completion of the purchase, Geert Maas will assist with packing the sculpture for travel and preparation of necessary documentation for customs clearance. Geert Maas will also provide English and Dutch language text to accompany the work for display in Veendam.

The gift will be personally presented to the City of Veendam by His Worship Mayor Colin Basran and Councillor Maxine Dehart as part of official ceremonies in Veendam in early May, 2015.

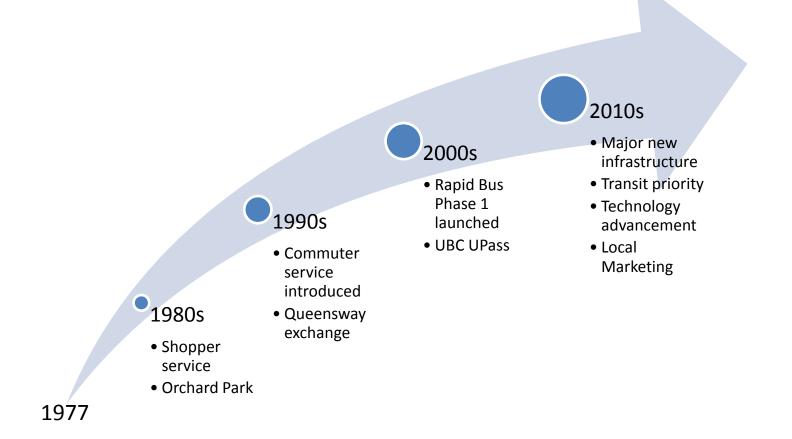

KELOWNA REGIONAL TRANSIT TIMELINE



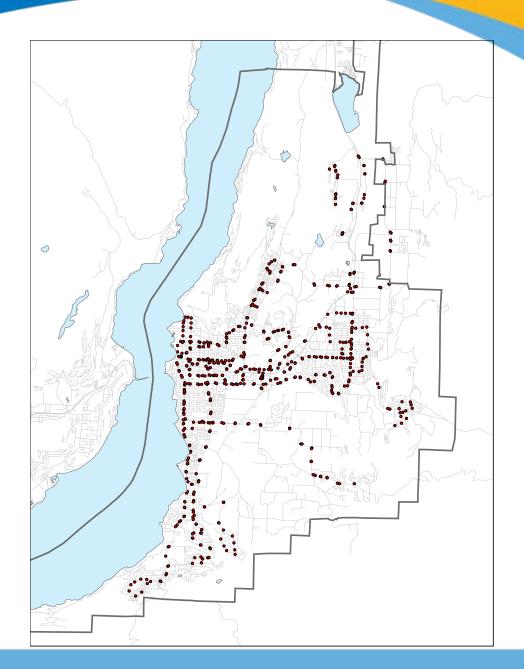

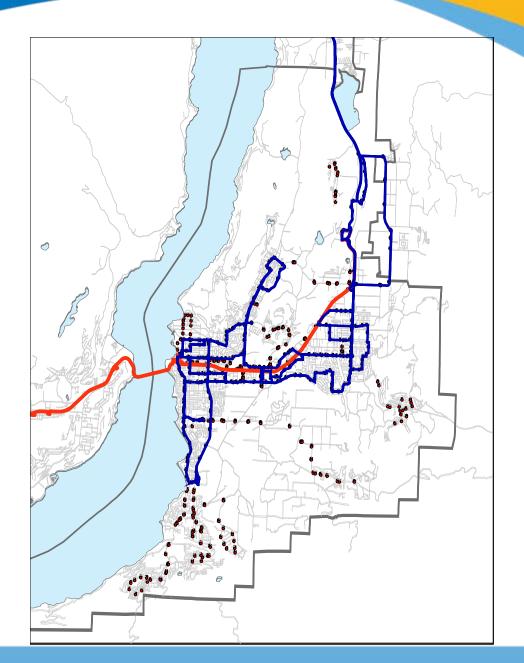

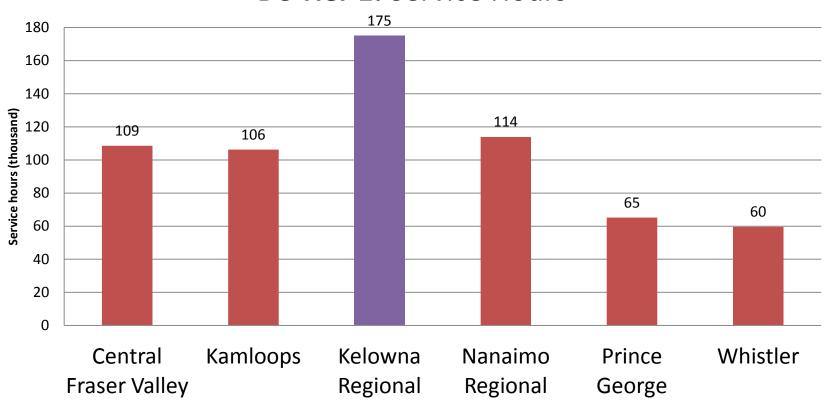

BC Tier 1: Service Hours





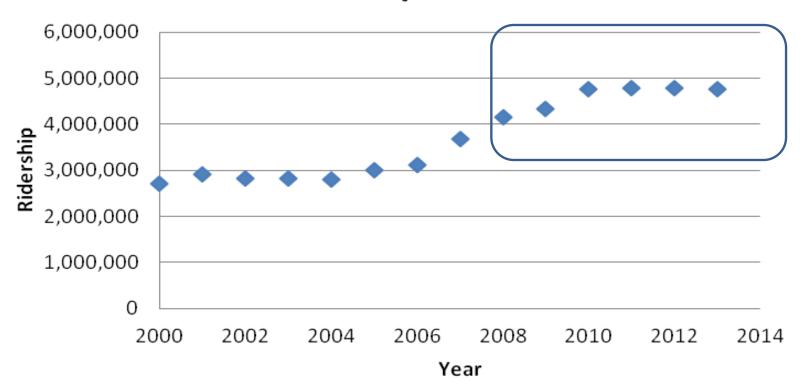

Transit Ridership 2000 to 2014





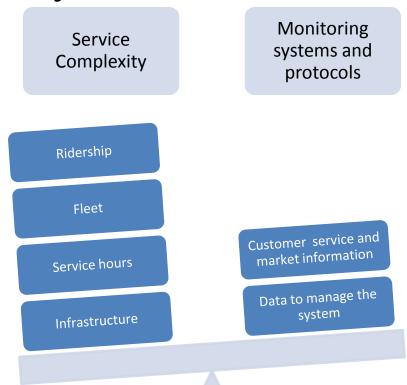

Background

The OBWB is an inter-regional government agency founded in 1970 to promote the shared water interests of Okanagan communities. Its mandate is to "provide leadership for sustainable water management to protect and enhance the quality of life and environment in the Okanagan Basin." The Okanagan Water Stewardship Council was established in March 2006 and renewed in December 2008 to provide independent technical advice, analysis, and policy recommendations to the OBWB.

The great strength of the Council is its diversity and expertise. It is comprised of First Nations, water user groups, non-profit organizations, scientists, local and senior government, academics, economic interests, and professional associations. The result is a thoughtful forum on water that respects differences and makes recommendations that benefit the entire Okanagan Basin.

The Council has provided important direction and advice to the Water Board, including the development of the *Okanagan Sustainable Water Strategy, Action Plan 1.0* (2008). The strategy provides an important context for 45 actions to be undertaken by the board and partner governments.
